Actions and commitments to the Sustainable Development Goals</a></p> <p>This volume, published in September 2018, covers Goal 15: Life on Land, and particularly Goal 15.3, which aims to achieve Land Degradation Neutrality (LDN) globally by 2030. Goal 15 and the significance of LDN targets have opened a window of opportunity for many countries to strengthen their policies for sustainable use of land and soils. A Better World: Volume 4 outlines the concept, the main elements and the current international framework for assessing the progress towards SDG target 15.3. It proposes a stepwise approach to further tailor national requirements with the overall goal of LDN implementation.</p>
