INTRODUCTION

Background of the report

In June 1995, the Netherlands became the third country to ratify the Convention to Combat Desertification (CCD), which entered into force on 26 December 1996. The objective of the Convention is to combat desertification and mitigate the effects of drought in countries experiencing serious land degradation and/or desertification.

So far four national reports have been prepared with regard to the Netherlands support in the implementation of the Convention, respectively for CoP3¹ (1999), for CoP4 (2000), for CRIC-1/CoP6 (2002), and in the year 2004 for CRIC-3/CoP7 (2005). The first two reports cover the activities and financial commitments of the bilateral, multilateral and private funding channels. The 2002 document differed from the earlier two reports² in that it covered selected thematic issues as determined during CoP5, which were reviewed by the Committee for the Review of the Implementation of the Convention (CRIC). The 2004 report tabled the Netherlands CCD-related activities and corresponding expenditure through bilateral and multilateral funding in African Affected Country parties.

The CoP5 created the Committee for the Review of the Implementation of the Convention (CRIC) in order to review the implementation process of the CCD in broader perspective. The Committee was asked not only to look at activities and financial aspects but also to concentrate on “key thematic topics” and “thematic and sectoral areas” of strategic importance in the formulation and implementation of the CCD National Action Plans (NAPs). The themes were formulated as a result of the analysis and discussion of the national reports of all Parties by the Ad Hoc Working Group and the President’s Summary of the Open Dialogue Sessions, as documented in the Annexes to the CoP5 Report.

CRIC’s next meeting (CRIC-5) will be held in late 2006 to discuss the results of the present reporting exercise, and prepare an advice to CoP8, which is due in 2007.

Structure of the report

The present report states the activities and corresponding expenditures through the bilateral and multilateral funding per country in Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean, and Central and Eastern Europe for the year 2005, in regional projects and in worldwide projects related to CCD objectives in the three regions, as well as the additional information as requested by the CRIC and specified below. The assumption is that in general the fluctuations per year will be limited.

Chapter 1 presents a summary of this report. Chapter 2 provides an overview of the information requested by the CRIC in three sections: a) the bilateral cooperation activities per country through Netherlands embassies in two regions Asia and Latin America and the Caribbean (no information was obtained on CCD-related activities in Central and Eastern Europe), b) the regional and worldwide activities (according to the responsible DGIS department in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs), c) CCD-related information provided by other Netherlands Ministries, and d) the information received from NGOs based in the Netherlands. Chapter 3 gives an overview of the relationships of these activities with the thematic areas and operational paragraphs requested by the CRIC as specified below.

The details of the collected data can be found in the annexes where they are presented according to the responsible unit in the form of tables in which the activities are listed per country, or as regional and worldwide activities. The tables present the following entries:

1. Project/Activity number.
2. Project code of the data system in the Netherlands
3. Project title
4. Expenditure in 2005 (Euros)
5. DAC/CRS code assigned to the project
6. Classification in 1 or more of the 7 thematic and sectoral areas as specified by Decision 8/COP4.
7. Indication of relationship to the Operational Paragraphs (OPs) of Decisions 1 and 4 of COP6 as far as filled in by the responsible units

Methodology and information collected

A detailed analysis of all projects by checking the contents on their relevance for UNCCD objectives for 2005 was not possible. However, a selection of projects from the general database of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Netherlands (Piramide) has been made that formed the basis for further analysis. The following selection steps were made:

1. On the basis of a very broad list of 103 OECD/DAC CRS codes believed to be relevant to CCD implementation and the location of the activities (Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean, Central and Eastern Europe, and Worldwide) a first selection was made. In the end, by the way, it appeared that of the CCD-related activities being funded corresponded only to 31 different CRS codes.
2. These activities were screened on their relevance based on the Rio Marker Desertification and in addition on the basis of project titles and a short description as found in the database. Project title and/or description that suggested CCD-relevance were included. CCD-related projects were identified as activities that contribute to combating desertification and land degradation in arid, semi-arid and sub-humid areas. Combating desertification and land degradation was interpreted in a broad sense and in line with the thematic and sectoral areas as defined in 8 COP4 (tabled below) - in arid, semi-arid and sub-humid areas.
3. The year 2005 was chosen as the year of reporting in order to make comparison possible. This has the consequence that only those CCD-related activities in the considered regions with expenditure in 2005 were selected. These steps resulted in an initial list of 160 activities.
4. This preliminary list was submitted to DGIS/DMW for initial screening and was reduced to 155 activities.
5. The preliminary list was made available to the relevant DGIS Departments (10) and Royal Netherlands Embassies (RNEs) in 26 countries in the considered regions for corrections and additions and more detailed information (titles, relation to thematic and sectoral areas and the Operational Paragraphs of the CoPs as requested by the CCD Secretariat in its Explanatory Note dd. 23/12/2005). In addition the DGIS Departments and the RNEs were requested to quantify the percentage of resources mobilised for each activity especially with regard to CCD relevance in 2005.
6. These data are elaborated further below and consolidated in tables annexed to this report.
7. In addition to the CCD-related activities implemented by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs also the Ministry of Economic Affairs (EZ) and Ministry of Agriculture, Nature and Food Quality (LNV) implement CCD-related activities. The Ministries were consulted to submit the relevant information, just as the and the Ministry of Housing, Spatial Planning and Environment (VROM).
8. Furthermore 25 Netherlands-based and –funded NGOs and research institutes with possible UNCCD-related activities in the three Regions have been consulted and asked to contribute to the Netherlands report. Through this process the data in the tables were corroborated and complemented.

Out of this search a number of 112 bilateral and multilateral activities (funded by the Netherlands Government through the International Cooperation programme) were relevant for CCD objectives. Together with activities implemented by other Ministries, research institutes or NGOs in the Netherlands (57 activities) this number increases to 169 activities..

Not all the selected projects in the lists can be classified as 100% contributing to CCD objectives. In many cases responsible units of the Ministry or the Embassies provided us with clear percentages of the share of projects contributing to CCD. These percentages were used to transform activity-related expenses over 2005 to adjusted CCD-related expenses.

The CCD-related worldwide projects implemented through the DGIS Departments require a specific set of assumptions to allow the calculation of financial resources made available to CCD objectives. The methodology used was the following:

1. The preliminary list of CCD-related activities in the three regions targeted for CCD Reporting was made available to the relevant DGIS Departments to calculate the percentage of contribution to CCD objectives (all non-Africa);
2. With the available response an average percentage (of 25%) was calculated that was used to weigh those projects for which detailed information was not available;
3. The results of the exercise are tabled in annex 3 with the indication of a total amount of resources made available over 2005 in the three regions relevant to this report (non-Africa);
4. It was decided not to try to specify the contributions from worldwide activities to the three regions as information to that effect was not sufficient.

For the calculation of mobilised resources for CCD objectives through the major Dutch NGOs such as OXFAM/Novib, ICCO, SNV, etc yet another methodology was used. It proved impossible to assess individual activities on relevance for CCD. Information was also not available on the division of resources over the continents. Instead, and to avoid double-counting, the total allocations in 2005 of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs to the NGOs/MFOs were taken as a basis to estimate the resources mobilised for CCD. Data are presented in annex 4. It is anticipated that 50% of the resources is spent in continents other than Africa. Part of the 50% expenditure, however, contributes to CCD objectives. Details as well as distribution over the three regions is not known.

The CCD Secretariat through its Explanatory Note dd. 23/12/2005 requested detailed information on seven key thematic topics which were identified by Decision 11/COP-1. These topics were extensively considered in the 2002 report and will not be repeated in the current document. For those interested we refer to the earlier document, which can be found on www.unccd.int

Further information requested in the Explanatory Note refers to the relationship of UNCCD implementation activities to a set of thematic and sectoral areas as specified by Decision 8/COP.4. These areas are:

- a. Sustainable land use management, including water, soil and vegetation in affected areas;
- b. Sustainable use and management of rangelands;
- c. Development of sustainable agricultural and ranching production systems;
- d. Development of new and renewable energy sources;
- e. Launching of reforestation/afforestation programmes and intensification of soil conservation programmes;
- f. Development of early warning systems for food security and drought forecasting;
- g. Desertification monitoring and assessment.

The methodology for establishing these relationships was included in the communication with the different departments and Embassies of the Netherlands as well as with the stakeholders. In principle a proposal was made based on the specifics of the different DAC/CRS codes (from the PIRAMIDE database of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs) which could be adapted for refinement. When this was not possible it was asked to indicate this relationship for each activity in the Excel-sheet sent with the request. The results are included – as much as possible - in the tables in the annexes and summarized in chapter 3.

The thematic areas correlate to the CRS codes as follows:

The Explanatory Note also requested the following specific information which is included per country wherever appropriate:

- Measures taken to support preparation and implementation of CCD National Action Programmes (NAPs);
- The conclusion of partnership agreements within the CCD framework.

As mentioned above, the document is the result of a reporting process in which the Netherlands actors involved in CCD related activities in drought-affected countries were invited to check the data on activities and expenditures and react on the above issues. The report, therefore, reflects the opinion of the involved organisations responsible for the implementation of the convention. These actors are:

- a) Royal Netherlands Embassies in Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean, Central and Eastern Europe in charge of the bilateral co-operation programmes (Chapter. 2.1)
- b) DGIS Departments based in the Hague that had activities with possible CCD relevance (Chapter.2.2)
- c) Other Netherlands Ministries participating in CCD-related activities (Chapter 2.3)
- d) Civil society organisations (Private sector, NGOs and R&D institutes) based in the Netherlands, and involved in development co-operation in affected country parties (Chapter. 2.4).

The response from the relevant Royal Netherlands Embassies was very positive. The response from non-government institutions was less. For those organisations there were no preliminary data available to be presented for correction and addition and thus more work was involved for them. Only few organisations checked the data thoroughly on CCD relevance which makes it impossible to have the data included in the totals of the financial contributions. Also the relation of the activities with the thematic areas and operational paragraphs was too complicated for many. Some of the organisations complained about the burden of reporting obligations and questionnaires.

This document does not cover the perspective of organisations which benefit from multilateral funding by the Netherlands, since they prepare their own reports.

1. SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

This report concerns the Netherlands contribution to CCD objectives and implementation over 2005 in Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean, and Central and Eastern Europe.

In the Netherlands bilateral cooperation six Embassies of the Netherlands in Asia and seven Embassies in Latin America report activities which contribute to the objectives of the convention. The Netherlands Embassies do not play the role of **chefs de file** for the UNCCD although some support the development of national policies on CCD issues like in Ecuador. In general, specific support by the Netherlands to the CCD National Action Programmes is very limited. Of course, Embassies mainstream issues of land degradation and desertification in programmes and activities are linked to the frameworks of the Poverty Reduction Strategy Papers that have been elaborated by the various countries. Therefore, most reported development activities in dry areas are related to issues of natural resources management and bear relevance to CCD objectives, however they are usually not directly linked to CCD National Action Programmes.

Five departments of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs support regional and worldwide activities related to UNCCD implementation activities. The Environment and Water Department (DMW) is the **Focal Point** for the UNCCD in the Netherlands and participates in the international policy discussions. DMW advises the minister for development co-operation on desertification issues and is responsible for the translation of international policy in national development policy. It supports the embassies with the integration of UNCCD issues in bilateral programs. DMW facilitates an activity implemented by the Dutch NGO Both ENDS which raises awareness in the Netherlands about the UNCCD and is to enhance NGO involvement in the CCD process. It aims at capacity building of civil society actors to become involved in the implementation of the CCD. DMW co-operated with the UNCCD secretariat to support affected countries in developing a synergistic approach towards the three Rio conventions and to promote the effectiveness of the NAPs.

As for the non-governmental organisations based in the Netherlands, and their partners in developing countries, their activities are often relevant to the objectives of the convention, in most cases in indirect ways. Many partner organisations of the Netherlands NGOs are located in countries affected by land degradation and desertification. Although their support usually is not directly focused on CCD implementation, partners are often involved in programmes and projects aiming at combating land degradation and sustainable livelihood. The Dutch NGOs all strongly support empowerment of civil society and as such contribute strongly to the CCD strategy and implementation.

The **resources mobilised** by the Netherlands for UNCCD related activities in Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean, and Central and Eastern Europe do not show large fluctuations over the years. The figures for 2005 may – within reason – be considered representative.

Funds made available through Netherlands Embassies

The decentralised units (Netherlands Embassies in Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean, and Central and Eastern Europe) account for a financial volume of **€ 10,4 million** during 2005 of which € 6,0 million accounts for Asia and € 4,4 million for Latin America and the Caribbean (see annexes 1 and 2). These expenses are corrected with UNCCD-related percentages as described in the methodology in the introductory Chapter. For the region Central and Eastern Europe no financial volume related to CCD implementation could be established.

Funds made directly available by departments of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in the Netherlands

Projects that fall under the responsibility of units in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs located in the Netherlands excluding those through the major NGOs (MFOs) account for **€24,6 million** during 2005 (see annex 3). Also in this case the expenses are corrected with UNCCD-related percentages as described in the methodology above.

Funds made available through major NGOs (MFOs)

Approximately € 500 million was disbursed by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in 2005 to Netherlands-based NGOs (also called Co-Financing Organisations – MFOs). For details see annex 4. The NGO/MFOs (SNV, ICCO, HIVOS, CORDAID, PLAN Netherlands and OXFAM/Novib) contribute in their programmes and partnerships to CCD objectives but it could not be established in detail to what extent and in which continent. Quantification and geographical distribution of resource mobilisation for CCD therefore proved to be impossible.

Funds made available through Netherlands Ministries (other than Foreign Affairs) and other stakeholders

The Ministry of Agriculture, Nature and Food Quality (LNV), the Ministry of Economic Affairs and Netherlands NGO stakeholders such as IUCN-NL and Both Ends contribute with resources to CCD implementation. The resources have not been quantified since specific information on financial volumes were lacking. Also some of the CCD-related stakeholder programmes (NGOs or research institutes) are funded by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (and therefore included in annex 3). Including them in the calculation would be double counting. Also many times specific information on resources or geographical coverage was not made available. Some activities relevant for CCD and funded through the OXFAM/Novib channel are also listed in this section, in Annex 5

Total resource mobilisation for CCD implementation

Of the total number of 105 activities (Annex 1, 2 and 3) that have been funded by the Netherlands Ministry of Foreign Affairs in Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean, and Central and Eastern Europe during 2005 a total of **€ 35 million** can be regarded as directly related towards achieving UNCCD objectives. More resources have been made available over 2005 through NGOs/MFOs, R&D institutes and Netherlands Ministries other than the Ministry of Foreign Affairs but these resources could neither be quantified sufficiently nor assessed on geographical distribution.

Policy framework

Sustainable poverty reduction has been the main objective of Dutch development cooperation for many years. To reach this objective, priority has been given to the poorest countries in the three regions under review. Poverty in dry marginal areas often has direct links to the processes of land degradation and desertification. Therefore, Netherlands' ODA policy of mainstreaming of environmental issues in PRSP programmes are in accordance with the Millennium Goals 1 and 7, and is also an important strategy to promote the UNCCD implementation goals.

2. THE CONSULTATIVE PROCESSES AND PARTNERSHIPS AGREEMENTS OF THE NETHERLANDS

2.1. Bilateral cooperation activities of Embassies³

2.1.1. Asia

China

The Netherlands Embassy in Beijing supports 2 CCD-related projects in Tibet: the Rangeland Management Project in Nakchu and the Qomolangma Conservation Programme. The objectives of the former are: 1) Demonstration of sustainable rangeland recovery and development strategies suited to conditions in Nakchu Prefecture's main ecosystems, and 2) Demonstration of an improved, more profitable system for the cooperative marketing of nomad families' livestock and livestock products. The objectives of the latter are towards integrated environmental conservation and sustainable livelihood improvement.

Indonesia

The Netherlands Embassy in Jakarta does not support the CCD national action programme in Indonesia because they never have been approached by the Government of Indonesia for assistance. However, the Embassy does support capacity building programmes (through the Worldbank) to counter land degradation.

Mongolia

The focus of the environment programme of The Netherlands for Mongolia is on Land resources management, Water resources management, Biodiversity conservation, Energy services, Drinking water supply and private sector support. The environmental programme will be implemented according to the Paris declaration, with specific attention to optimizing harmonization and alignment between donors and with the Government of Mongolia and according to the principles of sustainable development.

The Government of Mongolia shows its commitment to environmental protection through its signatory to all major environmental treaties, including the United Nations Convention on Biological Diversity (UNCBD), the Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD) and the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC). The programmes of the Embassy will pursue the above-mentioned conventions through (whenever possible rights-based) activities in the realm of the environmental programme and good governance/sustainable development programme.

According to the *Economic Growth Support and Poverty Reduction Strategy* (EGSPRS) and National Action plans, six principal areas of environmental concern have been identified by the Government of Mongolia:

1. Land resources management, with special attention to land degradation, pasture degradation, desertification and soil degradation and forest degradation.
2. Solid waste management, with special attention increased urban and industrial pollution.
3. Water supply and water quality with special attention to the country's scarce water resources, provision of adequate drinking water quality and to urban water consumption.
4. Biodiversity conservation, with special attention to protected areas.
5. Air pollution, with special attention to indoor air pollution and vehicular pollution in Ulaanbaatar city.
6. Energy and climate change, with special attention to energy efficiency.

By aligning to these six principal areas of environmental concern, The Netherlands supports CCD national action programmes.

The Mongolian Ministry of Finance is an important counterpart for the donor community, coordinating donor contacts and financial aid. (Bi-) Annual donor meetings are organised under auspices of the MFA. The Chef de File supports the donors with moving toward aligning their support for capacity building, private sector development and governance, in line with EGSPRS objectives. CCD-related projects in Mongolia include Community-based conservation of the biodiversity in the Altai Sayan Region; Sustainable use of grasslands;

Biodiversity Conservation in the forest steppe of Khan Khentii; and Hustai Nuruu Park biodiversity conservation.

Pakistan

Environment is one of the priority areas of the Royal Netherlands Embassy in Islamabad. The main CCD-related activities of the Netherlands in Pakistan are support to the Pakistan Environment Programme (PEP) and the IUCN-managed Balochistan Programme. The Pakistan Environment Programme (PEP), initiated in July 1994, is a capacity programme of key institutions for carrying the environment agenda in Pakistan. 4 Government implementing partners and 2 NGOs are enabled to more effectively support implementation of the Pakistan National Conservation Strategy, and other sustainable development initiatives at the federal, provincial, and local level. Combating desertification and land degradation is a theme that is integrated in the work of the participating partners.

Balochistan is an arid, largely mountainous province of Pakistan. It endures frequent spells of drought, flash floods and earthquakes. In order to address the environmental problems a conservation strategy was prepared with the technical and financial assistance of IUCN and the Royal Netherlands Embassy (RNE). The Balochistan Programme emerged in this context. The Balochistan programme (March 2002-Feb 2007) aims at improving the quality of life of people through strengthening the institutional and human capacity in the province for sustainable and equitable use of natural resources in the forest, water and rangeland sectors.

Sri Lanka

The Netherland Embassy in Colombo supports CCD-related activities in the field of capacity building in environmental management and biodiversity conservation. All projects contribute to OP 20 and support sustainable land use and management of resources. The programme with IWMI additionally supports sustainable agricultural production systems.

In 2005 the Embassy did not support the Sri Lanka CCD National action programme and no new partnerships were established. The Embassy is pursuing environmental management, supporting the UNCCD, through support to the private sector. National Chambers of Commerce are assisted to incorporate social corporate responsibility and specific environmental concerns in their training and support programmes for their affiliated private sector organisations.

Yemen

The one project with CCD relevance in Yemen is technical support to assist the Rural Women Development Directorate of the Ministry of Agriculture in the implementation of its policy on gender in agriculture and food security.

Netherlands' Resource mobilisation on CCD for Asia

The total number of CCD-related activities in Asia with financial assistance of The Netherlands is 23 with an estimated € 6,002,400 of resources mobilised specifically targeted to CCD implementation. More details can be found in Annex 1.

2.1.2. Latin America and the Caribbean

Bolivia

The Netherlands Embassy in La Paz contributes to the Government of Bolivia, Ministry for Sustainable Development, to the formulation of policies and CCD action programme. It further supports activities in CCD-related agro-technology and bio-trade.

Brazil

Through the bilateral development cooperation programme of the Netherlands in Brazil three budget lines of the National Environmental Fund (FNMA) were supported in 2005. Under the budget line to combat desertification the preparation of policy plans at state level was supported. In all states in the semi-arid North-East of Brazil research has been carried out to analyse the reasons for desertification. Best practices have been identified and concrete policy measures have been proposed to combat desertification.

Colombia

The bilateral programme in Colombia has no specific programme to combat desertification. There is therefore no specific CCD-related support of respective Colombian policy development and implementation. There is

however a minimal CCD-related component in the “Red Comercio Comunitario” programme where the organisation works with local agricultural cooperatives in desert areas.

El Salvador

The Netherlands Embassy in San José supports sustainable agriculture development in El Salvador in collaboration with the FAO.

Ecuador

In the "Ecuador Exit Strategy of The Netherlands Bilateral Cooperation" for 2004-2005, ending in June 2006, four activities were included in relation to desertification issues, most of them associated with a broader environmental perspective and objectives. All activities were intended to consolidate previous efforts, and gave special attention to water management issues, soil and land degradation in fragile areas which may lead to desertification if no prevention/protection measures were taken. Capacity building and technical training, policy making and multi-stakeholders approaches were part of the project strategies. Two activities include reforestation in watersheds and dry-areas. Only one activity directly addressed UNCCD, in terms of support to the Ministry of the Environment to prepare the National Report for the UNCCD COP7.

The Netherlands Embassy in Quito has also promoted donor coordination and other donor's involvement in a common agenda. Support to the Capacity Building initiative CAMAREN was a joint effort with COSUDE (Switzerland).

Guatemala

The Netherlands Embassy in Guatemala is considering to assist funding the implementation of the National CCD Action Programme in Guatemala. This plan has been shelved for a couple of years already and together with Italy (co-financing) the Netherlands wish to assist the Ministry of Environment (MARN) to have this plan operational.

The general approach of the Netherlands Embassy in Guatemala is based on the support to associations of peasant organisations who are contributing to the objectives of the CCD, primarily OP10. They are supported by field activities, organisational strengthening and advocacy. On top of that assistance is given to mainstreaming of Environment and CCD-related issues in policies, budgets and national green accounts. More specifically projects include the project Autogestión Cho'rtí : ‘Manejo sostenible de los recursos naturales en Zacapa y Chiquimula’. The Environment Fund supported by the Netherlands finances the environmental institutions in Guatemala, strengthening strategic organisations relevant for the conservation of the environment and the development of norms and standards, rules and regulations that rule the conservation of the Environment. Environmental Justice, empowerment of the weaker groups and social equity are topics that are supported especially in the region of Sarstún-Motagua. Other projects include Environmental Monitoring/Perfil Ambiental which is implementing a strategic environmental monitoring system with the aim to strengthen the public involvement in environmental policy development. The project to stimulate the Incentives to the Forestry sector is partly CCD relevant. Small landowners also in the dry areas can have access to credits to have sustainable management of their model forests.

Peru

In Peru the Netherlands is also closing the environment programme. Some activities which are relevant to CCD objectives, however, are still ongoing. The project JEMABAON on Indigenous Communities in the Ucayali region that manage their natural resources like their communal forests in such a way that they obtain economic benefits. The project PROCLIM 1 with CONAM (the Consejo Nacional del Ambiente) carries out capacity building activities for an effective management of human, institutional and financial resources of Peru in aspects that deal with Climate change and Air quality.

Furthermore, a project that recently closed but was very important to CCD objectives is the SNV supported project Dry Forest Management in Lambayeque in Piura, Tumbes. This activity was to consolidate the integrated management and sustainable use of the dry forest resources at the northern coast of Peru in order to support government efforts to alleviate poverty of rural populations while promoting forests conservation. In 2005 no financial contributions have been made to this project.

Netherlands' Resource mobilisation on CCD for Latin America and the Caribbean

The total number of CCD-related activities in Latin America and the Caribbean is 23 with an estimated €4,430,400 of resources mobilised specifically targeted to CCD implementation. More details can be found in Annex 2.

2.2 Departments of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs in the Netherlands

The following departments of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Netherlands are involved in regional and worldwide activities related to UNCCD implementation activities:

- Environment and Water Department (DMW, formerly known as DML)
- Department for Cultural Cooperation, Education and Research (DCO)
- Department for Sustainable Economic Development (DDE)
- Department for Social and Institutional Development (DSI)
- Department for United Nations and International Financial Institutions (DVF)

DMW (formerly DML)

The Environment and Water Department (DMW) presently consists of four divisions:

- Natural resources and ecosystems (DMW/NE), also responsible for the CCD
- Policies (DMW/NB)
- Infrastructure and environment (DMW/IB)
- Financial management and quality control (DMW/FK)

DMW is the Focal Point for the UNCCD in the Netherlands and participates in the international policy discussions. DMW liaises with the Netherlands' focal points for biodiversity and for climate. DMW advises the Minister for development co-operation on desertification issues. DMW is responsible for the translation of international policy in national development policy and supports the Embassies with the integration of UNCCD issues in bilateral programmes. DMW supported the Embassies with a programme to raise awareness on the existence of the UNCCD and NAPs. Embassies were stimulated to integrate NAPs in the bilateral programmes and to support partner countries with the integration of NAPs in broader sustainable development policies like PRSPs. DMW has an agreement with the Dutch NGO Both Ends with the objective to raise awareness in the Netherlands about the UNCCD, its instruments and implementation. A small project funded through DMW to co-operate with the UNCCD secretariat to support affected countries in developing a synergistic approach towards the three Rio conventions has come to an end in 2005. Through the Support group SMW (Environment and Water) DMW is assisted in the various CCD related processes on policy level by Wageningen International (formerly the International Agricultural Centre/IAC). This ranged from support in reporting processes to participation in international meetings on CCD. During 2005 The Netherlands supported the Compilation of all CCD reports of the EU (which were targeted to Africa).

Most implemented UNCCD related activities, supported by the Netherlands, are managed by the DMW/NE division and concern projects with a – in principle – worldwide coverage. Many of these concern the funding of contributions to multilateral organisations, such as the Global Environment Facility (GEF), but also to private (not only Netherlands-based) organisations like IUCN-NL, Fauna and Flora International, WWF and Both Ends through the TMF (thematic co-financing) programme. The activities fall mainly in the thematic area a) Sustainable Land Use Management, incl. water, soil, vegetation”, and to a lesser extent in category e) Re/afforestation Programmes and Soil & Water Conservation”(when dry areas are concerned).

Other relevant support, though not directly affecting CCD objectives is the financial support to the Netherlands Commission for Environmental Impact Assessment (NCEIA). The NCEIA is an expertise institute for the strengthening of national government systems for EIA and SEA (Strategic Environmental Analysis), for the support to capacity building, build up of regulations, pilot schemes regarding EIA and SEA, and support to controversial and complex EIA or SEA exercises. As such it contributes to sustainable development (improved management of land, water, and natural resources in general).

The most quoted Operational Paragraphs in the list of DMW activities are OP 6 “support to South-South and South-North cooperation”, OP 9 “Promotion of small and medium sized projects and activities at the local level”, OP 10 “Support to the rehabilitation of degraded ecosystems including those caused by refugee influxes” and OP 20 “Promotion of capacity-building measures and participatory processes in the field of natural resources management”.

DCO

Through the Department for Cultural Cooperation, Education and Research (DCO) the Netherlands supports worldwide activities with regional components in Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean, and Central and Eastern Europe. DCO supports (among others) CGIAR research programmes (with varying components of CCD-related research in the three regions under consideration) of a variety of organisations such as CIAT, ICRISAT, CIMMYT, ICARDA IRRI, etc. More details can be found in the section on the Committee on Science

and Technology (CST) in chapter 5.

DDE

The Department for Sustainable Economic Development (DDE) supports both regional and worldwide activities. DDE's largest contribution is to the worldwide ORET/MILIEV incentive programme. This programme aims to promote employment opportunities and private business in developing countries while at the same time to contribute to improved environmental management. The programme reduces the costs for developing countries of projects which fall within the programme's criteria through grants for acquiring goods, services and works in the Netherlands. DDE also supports the Max Havelaar programme of certified products from small farmers in developing countries, which are checked on environmentally sustainable production systems.

All DDE activities contribute indirectly to UNCCD implementation activities, mostly in the categories a) Sustainable Land Use Management and c) Development of sustainable agricultural and ranching production systems.

DSI

The Department for Social and Institutional Development (DSI) supports the implementation of CCD indirectly through Associate Expert programmes at IPGRI, CIP, ILRI, ICRAF and ICRISAT, but most importantly through support to Netherlands MFOs for approximately € 500 million in 2005. Through their partnership projects with NGOs in developing countries they are partly engaged in UNCCD implementation activities. The activities are relevant for OP6, Support to South-South and North-South cooperation; OP9, Promotion of Small and Medium Sized Projects and Activities at the Local Level; OP20, Promotion of Capacity Building Measures and Participatory Processes in the Field of Natural Resources Management. However, estimates of the proportion of the total financial contributions that are relevant to CCD objectives are difficult to give. The estimates can be found in Annex 4.

DVF

Department for United Nations and International Financial Institutions (DVF) supports worldwide programmes with CCD relevance such as those with FAO. For this reporting exercise no information became available on the specific CCD related activities as part of contributions of The Netherlands to UNEP and UNDP. Consequently these contributions have been held outside the calculation of total contributions.

Netherlands' Resource mobilisation Worldwide on CCD related to Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean and Central and Eastern Europe in general

The total number of CCD-related worldwide activities through the Ministry of Foreign Affairs is 59 with an estimated € 24,627,200 of resources mobilised specifically targeted to CCD implementation. Information is not available to assign percentages of the total amount over the three regions Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean, and Central and Eastern Europe. More details can be found in Annex 3.

2.3 CCD-related activities of other Ministries in the Netherlands

Apart from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs/DGIS there 2 more Netherlands Ministries contributing to the implementation of the CCD: the Ministry of Agriculture, Nature and Food Quality (LNV) and the Ministry of Economic Affairs (EZ).

Ministry of LNV

In the Netherlands the Ministry of Agriculture, Nature and Food Quality (LNV) is contact organisation for the Food and Agriculture Organisation in Rome (FAO). From that responsibility and its involvement with all three Rome-based UN-organisations, the Ministry recognises the importance of the mandate of the organisations, especially the FAO, in the development of sustainable agriculture, forestry and fisheries, rural development and the sustainable use and management of natural resources. It is within this framework of international commitments and the involvement with the Rome-based organisations that the Ministry translated international agreements into national policy priority areas, which are: i) markets and trade, ii) rural development and sustainable agriculture, iii) biodiversity, and iv) water for food and ecosystems. The approach of the Ministry to the implementation of the CCD fits within this policy framework.

The Ministry of LNV carried out a number of activities that contributed to the implementation of CCD in the regions Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean, and Central and Eastern Europe.

1. Research programme on sustainable agriculture and rural development

LNV finances a long term research partnership with Wageningen University. In 2005 12 projects were implemented for an amount of around 1 million euros. The projects and programmes related to a whole range of topics varying from sustainable farming systems with a special emphasis on the small farmers, land use scenario's, analysis of forest and soil degradation, rural livelihood improvement and soil fertility to policy dialogue on issues of environmentally sustainable agriculture in peri-urban areas. In most cases the projects and programmes consist of fundamental research, research for policy support, capacity building and information sharing. The CCD-related projects in 2005 were:

- Himalayan Degradation - an interdisciplinary approach to analyse the dynamics of forest and soil degradation and to develop sustainable agro-ecological strategies for fragile Himalayan watersheds;
- IRMLA – Systems research network for Integrated Resource Management and Land use Analysis in East and South East Asia;
- VEGSYS - Sustainable technologies for pest, disease and soil fertility management in smallholder vegetable production in China and Vietnam;
- APWAM: Network Project on Water Management in Andhra Pradesh

Budget for 2005 was € 288 000. The research activities contributed to the thematic and sectoral areas 'a' and 'c' and to the following Operational Paragraphs: Decision 1/COP6 – OP6, OP9, OP10 and OP20.

2. Water for food and ecosystems Conference

From 31 January- 2 February 2005 the Netherlands hosted and organised together with FAO the Conference Water for Food and Ecosystems with the goal to facilitate the implementation of the existing international commitments on sustainable water use in relation to food and ecosystems. The conference provided a high-level platform to help governments identify management practices, practical lessons learned and the necessary enabling environments that lead to sustainable water use at the river basin level and the harmonization of food production and ecosystem management with a view to facilitate implementation. The conference contributed to the further development and implementation of international water-related policies and programmes adopted by the World Summit on Sustainable Development, FAO, the Convention on Biological Diversity, the Ramsar Convention on Wetlands, and other international forums, like UNCCD.

The Netherlands co-financed this conference with an amount of Euro 2,2 million. The conference contributed to the thematic area of sustainable land use, including water, soil and vegetation in affected areas (thematic and sectoral area 'a') and to the following Operational Paragraphs: Decision 1/COP6 - OP4, OP6, OP32.

3. Sustainable use and access to land through the "Land Partnership"

As a part of the follow-up of the WSSD in Johannesburg the Netherlands put together an action plan after the Summit. One element in that plan is the Land Partnership, initiated by LNV and the Dutch Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the International Land Coalition. The two-year land partnership programme aims at opening wider space to debate and negotiate land policies and land administration for the purpose of establishing more equitable land ownership. The programme is implemented in four countries: Philippines, Indonesia, Guatemala and South Africa. The programme has resulted in creating opportunities and spaces for dialogue between institutions making decisions on land policy at the national level in the four countries. The national roundtable in the Philippines for example led to debates and increased understanding of the roles of different groups and joint actions between non governmental organisations, civil society and government. And in the other countries participatory consultations on the impact of current land policies and reforms with affected communities will feed into district level roundtables that will be attended by governments, NGOs, CSOs and donors, feeding into national land policy debates and action plans.

The Netherlands financed the Land Partnership with an amount of around € 85 000 in 2005. The conference contributed to the thematic area of sustainable land use, including water, soil and vegetation in affected areas (thematic and sectoral area 'a') and to the following Operational Paragraphs: Decision 1/COP6 – OP6, OP32, Decision 4/COP6 – OP4.

Ministry of EZ

The Ministry of Economic Affairs (EZ) and more specifically its Agency for International Business and Co-operation - the EVD - provides assistance to the economies in Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean, and Central and Eastern Europe that in some cases may be CCD-related. EVD financial support consists of a number of schemes and programmes supporting specified sectors and businesses on a project-by-project basis. The programmes also involve international cooperation in emerging economies. The support is not limited to

financing; it also contributes the expertise that businesses, public and private-sector institutions and potential trade partners need to succeed.

The EVD hosts four relevant financing programmes that all may contribute to CCD objectives. The available information at the time of reporting however does not allow further qualification or quantification of each of the programmes to be able to report in detail which activities and what resources contributed to CCD in any of the three regions. The 4 programmes are:

1. International Governmental Cooperation (IPS) with project support in Central and Eastern Europe in the domains of environment and economy. Projects aim to assist the Candidate Countries in meeting the criteria for EU membership through bilateral co-operation projects focussing on the transposition, implementation and enforcement of European legislation. Candidate Countries as well as New Member States may receive assistance in the framework of short term assistance project programmes (PPA-short and Matra-flex) focussed on capacity and relationship building. The programmes are financed by the Netherlands Ministries of Economic Affairs, Foreign Affairs and the Ministry of Housing, Spatial Planning and the Environment. The EVD co-ordinates the project identification and selection process for all programmes mentioned. Projects concern technical assistance only and focus on institutional strengthening and/or capacity building. These projects are carried out by Netherlands private and/or public parties. CCD-related projects include activities to strengthen capacity in the water sectors and to bring national policies in line with EU policies; to strengthen spatial planning and nature conservation in contribution to the Pan European Ecological Network (PEEN); grassland conservation in Turkey; etc.
2. Programme for Cooperation with Emerging Markets (PSOM). PSOM offers financial support to entrepreneurs who are planning to invest in emerging markets in Eastern Europe, Africa, Asia, the Middle East and Latin America. The programme entails pilot investments of Dutch companies, who set up a new business venture together with a local company in one of the selected countries.
3. Partners for Water Programme (PvW) with projects worldwide in support of integrated river basin management approaches. The first phase of the PvW ended in 2004 while the second phase started late 2005 resulting in limited activities and expenditure in 2005.
4. Programme for Economic Co-operation in Projects (PESP). PESP is a programme that strengthens bilateral economic relations with non-OECD countries (including Hungary, Poland, the Czech Republic, Turkey, Mexico, South Korea, Aruba and the Netherlands Antilles) with the aim of increasing the likelihood of Dutch companies obtaining orders in those countries. Dutch companies and consortiums can submit proposals for activities leading up to export transactions. The activities may be feasibility studies, project identification, and investment preparation studies. These activities must result in early familiarisation of the foreign party with the offers of Dutch companies, and an increased probability of the Dutch business community acquiring orders in the project implementation phase. PESP is applicable for projects and not for market research or acquisition activities of individual companies. Some of the initiatives may be CCD relevant.

Some activities that clearly contribute to CCD objectives have been included in Annex 5.

2.4 NGOs and relevant research institutes based in the Netherlands

Of the Netherlands-based NGOs who were approached to report on their CCD-related activities in Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean, and Central and Eastern Europe roughly 25% responded with information. The following are summaries of their contributions while more details on project information is contained in annex 5. Financial contributions are not calculated because of the incomprehensiveness of the information. Also the financial contributions of some activities may be already part of one of the activities mentioned in annex 1, 2 or 3, funded by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. To avoid double counting this section serves as an illustration.

OXFAM/Novib

OXFAM/Novib is one of the major NGOs (MFOs) of the Netherlands that receives core funding from the Netherlands (until this date). OXFAM/Novib supports local organisations in the South that strive for a better world without poverty and by influencing policies. Of the huge list of projects some activities have been selected that contribute to CCD objectives (see Annex 5). OXFAM/Novib is one of the NGOs that cooperate with organisations in countries where the Netherlands Government has no international cooperation relation anymore, like is the case in India. Grass root organisations are supported, like Grama Vika, that implement rural development projects. In Kolar District, Karnataka State, Grama Vika supports credit programmes, soil improvement and food security programmes and capacity building activities.

In Brazil an example of a CCD related activity is the support to the local organisation CAATINGA (Centro de Assessoria e Apoio aos Trabalhadores e Instituições não Governamentais Alternativas). This organisation organises educational programmes on agro-ecology in rural areas. It also implements agro-ecological development programmes with a view to develop shared technologies, methodologies and agro-ecological procedures which contribute to strengthening the sustainability of family agriculture in the semi-arid regions of Brazil. It aims to develop and disseminate educational programmes suited to the social, economic, cultural and environmental conditions of the semi-arid regions. Some of the activities are listed in Annex 5.

ISRIC

ISRIC - World Soil Information is an independent foundation with a global mandate, funded by the Netherlands Government. ISRIC has a strategic association with Wageningen University and Research Centre to inform and educate: through the World Soil Museum - public information, discussion and publication; as ICSU World Data Centre for Soils - to serve the scientific community as custodian of global soil information; and to undertake applied research on land and water resources. It's CCD-related activities over 2005 are the following.

1. ISRIC has, in collaboration with JRC/IES in Italy, made digital copies of its soil and soil-related maps, which are now freely available through internet: http://eusoils.jrc.it/esdb_archive/EuDASM/EUDASM.htm and through a series of DVDs. In addition, ISRIC is embarking on digitizing the accompanying information in related reports available as well. ISRIC contribution is about € 10 000.
2. ISRIC has, at the request of UNEP, taken the lead in compiling the Land Chapter GEO 4 which includes a major section on desertification. ISRIC contribution is about € 15 000.
3. ISRIC contributes to the knowledge and dissemination of best land practices through its collaboration in the WOCAT (World Overview of Conservation Approaches and Technologies) program. This program documents from farmers and other key stakeholders successful land management technologies and promotes transfer of these technologies to areas with similar socio-economic and environmental conditions. ISRIC contribution is about € 20 000.
4. Supported through IFAD, ISRIC is currently engaged in proof-of-concept activities to demonstrate the feasibility of *Green Water Credits* as a global mechanism of *payment for environmental services*, whereby downstream beneficiaries pay upstream land users for good management practices - ensuring better use of available water. ISRIC contribution is about € 40 000.
5. Through the GLADA project, funded by GEF, ISRIC will carry out a new assessment of the status of land degradation world-wide, with special emphasis on drylands. This project is part of FAO's LADA initiative, executed by UNEP. ISRIC contribution is about € 300000.

Total contribution of ISRIC to CCD-related activities in Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean, and Central and Eastern Europe over 2005: € 385 000.

Both Ends

Both ENDS is a Netherlands-based NGO that strives for social justice and a sustainable environment by connecting and empowering civil society organisations, key players in poverty reduction and the improvement of environmental governance. Under the theme of sustainable land use, Both ENDS tries to strengthen CSO initiatives, and supports implementation and replication of these initiatives. Furthermore Both ENDS works towards visions and priorities of CSOs being reflected and recognised in local and national decision-making processes as well as in regional and international land use related policy processes. Both ENDS is using the framework of the UNCCD whenever relevant and effective, and encourages CSO to use the UNCCD and it's NAPs as one of the available tools for improving land use practises and policies. Both ENDS is of the opinion that implementation of the UNCCD cannot do without local actors because of their field experience, local knowledge, their position close to the populations and their ability to act as a relay between central authorities and local populations.

Most activities of Both ENDS in 2005 related to the UNCCD have been focussed on Africa. These are not mentioned in this overview. General (service) activities are mentioned because they serve both an African and global audience.

Relevant projects in 2005:

1. TMF programme in support of sustainable land use
 - 1 newsletter with specific focus on youth audience made, available on internet and in hard-copy distributed at COP7; application of donor data-base with focus on drylands; 1 donor survey made on desertification and dry lands; 1 information paper written on local contributions to the Rio Conventions and synergies; various information, networking and fundraising services provided to

CSOs. Several African and Indian organisations working on drylands issues were assisted with fundraising and networking.

- One CSO strategy meeting co-organised in Ecuador on Analog Forestry – a method to restore degraded ecosystems and provide sustainable livelihoods
- Joint preparation and participation in CRIC 3 and COP 7 – including with Brazilian and Ecuadorian NGOs. Side event on Analog Forestry as restoration method organized at COP7, jointly organized ODS (Office of Development Studies/UNDP) at COP7; an ODS background paper written on crisis management and long-term adaptation through local action in dry lands.
- Cooperation with the other members of the European Networking Initiative on Desertification (eniD) regarding policy influencing in Europe

2. Encyclopaedia of Sustainability

- support of the International Analog Forestry Network under the theme of ecological restoration with fundraising, co-organising a meeting in Quito, promoting the approach, suggesting potential new members, supporting the secretariat.
- Linking activities resulting in exchange of seeds between Indian groups' nurseries for restoration purposes
- Support to the Bolivian NGO PROBIOMA, working on organic pest control: testing methods of organic pest control in dryland areas, facilitating participation of PROBIOMA in soy discussions in Brazil and Europe
- Integration of 3 Latin American, 4 Asian and 1 CEE partner CSOs in EU worldwide proposal on desertification.

3. Participation in DAS advisory board of IUCN-NL (small grants for dry areas)

Most DAS grants were for African CSOs but Both ENDS suggested 4 proposals from Asia and Latin America that got funded.

4. Support to CASA dry areas fund

Both ENDS is participating as an advisory board member in a small grants fund called CASA – Centro de Apoio Socio-Ambiental providing small grants and capacity building in Brazil and neighbouring countries. Through Both ENDS CASA received a grant from the IUCN-NL to strengthen organisations in Brazil, Argentina and Bolivia working in dryland areas and the implementation of the UNCCD in their respective countries.

Funds provided for Southern NGOs (except Africa) for above-mentioned activities: through TMF sustainable land use – € 40.000; through the Encyclopaedia of Sustainability: € 12.000.

IUCN-NL

With funds of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs IUCN-NL has established a small grants programme for project funding in dry and sub-humid areas. While the emphasis in funding lies in Africa, activities also are funded in other continents. IUCN-NL supports ecosystem approaches in multi-stakeholder settings with an emphasis on capacity building and the creation of synergy between the different levels of intervention. Within this framework proposals are eligible for funding when they contribute to:

- Poverty alleviation through the conservation, restoration and sustainable management of dry and sub-humid ecosystems;
- Capacity building of local NGOs or CBOs;
- Improved policy influencing at all levels.

CCD relevant expenditure in 2005 in Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean, and Central and Eastern Europe through the TMF funded Dry and Sub-Humid Areas (DAS) small grants programme: € 258 417. Funded projects are tabled in annex 5.

3. RELATIONSHIPS WITH THEMATIC AND SECTORAL AREAS AND OPERATIONAL PARAGRAPHS

This section provides an overview of how the reported CCD-related activities (bilateral cooperation as well as worldwide activities) contribute to the thematic and sectoral areas as well as to the defined Operational Paragraphs (OPs) as requested in the Explanatory Note of the CCD Secretariat.

3.1. Bilateral cooperation

a) Sustainable land use management, including water, soil and vegetation

Not surprisingly, this is by far the most quoted relationship of the activities implemented through bilateral cooperation programmes in the various Asia and Latin American countries. After all, environment is a cross-cutting issue in the development cooperation managed by the Netherlands Embassies, and all programmes aiming at rural and agricultural development are supposed to promote environmental sustainability and prevent land degradation

b) Sustainable use and management of rangelands

Especially the bilateral cooperation programmes in Asia, most especially in China, Pakistan and Mongolia, focus on rangeland management. This is not surprising considering the importance of extensive livestock production in these areas.

c) Sustainable agriculture & ranching production systems

Sustainable agriculture and ranching production systems are on the other hand more reported upon in Latin America and the Caribbean, most notably in Bolivia and Colombia.

d) New and renewable energy sources

This thematic topic receives due attention in Dutch bilateral cooperation, especially in Asia. The large biogas programmes in Asia (for example in Nepal and Vietnam) are effective in countering deforestation and are innovative in this sector.

e) Re/afforestation programmes and soil & water conservation (SWC)

Reforestation programmes score high in the bilateral cooperation programmes in four countries, i.e. Bolivia, Ecuador, Guatemala and Peru. In Asia the focus on reforestation is less. This confirms that reforestation projects in Latin America funded by the Netherlands are important instruments for the rehabilitation of degraded lands. They implement and train local people in soil conservation related activities, and in measures to improve water retention and soil fertility through agroforestry techniques.

f) Early warning systems food and drought

This topic receives little attention in bilateral cooperation of the Netherlands through the Embassies. It scores only with 1 project in Mongolia related to the National Geo-information Centre initiative.

g) Desertification monitoring and assessment

Desertification monitoring is an important component of projects in China, Pakistan, Sri Lanka and Mongolia in Asia; and in Bolivia, Brazil, Ecuador and Peru.

3.2. Worldwide and regional activities by Netherlands Ministries and NGOs

The worldwide activities (see Annex 3) show the same tendency as those in bilateral cooperation, i.e. a predominance of relationship to - in first place - topic a) Sustainable land use management, incl. water, soil, vegetation and to - in second place - topic c) Sustainable agriculture & ranching production systems. Topic g) Desertification monitoring and assessment also scores high, especially as supported through DMW.

Concerning the Operational Paragraphs, DMW reports relationships mostly to OP 6 “Support to South-South and North-South cooperation”, to OP 9 “Promotion of small and medium sized projects and activities at the local level”, to OP10 “Support to the rehabilitation of degraded ecosystems including those caused by refugee influxes” and to OP 20 “Promotion of capacity-building measures and participatory processes in the field of natural resources management”. DMW supported the Global Environmental Facility (GEF) which relates to OP 4 Strengthening of ongoing bilateral and multilateral assistance within the framework of UNCCD.

Next to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs also other Netherlands stakeholders provided information:

The Ministries EZ and LNV and also IUCN, OXFAM/Novib and Both Ends (see Annex 5). Their activities are again mainly in the category a) for as much as the information was provided.

Concerning the Operational Paragraphs, relationships were especially seen with OP 6 Support to South-South and North-South cooperation, to OP 9 Promotion of small and medium sized projects and activities at the local level, and to OP20 Promotion of capacity-building measures and participatory processes in the field of natural resources management.

4. DISCUSSION ON THE CCD RELATED CONTRIBUTION OF THE NETHERLANDS TO THE MILLENNIUM DEVELOPMENT GOALS

This section aims to give an indication of the relations between contributions of the Netherlands to the implementation of the UN Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD) and to the Millennium Development Goals (MDGs). The figures in this section need to be treated with great caution as no proven methodology to measure the links between the two has been established, nor sufficiently discussed or agreed upon yet.

Objectives of both the UNCCD and the MDGs

The objectives of the *UNCCD Convention* (Convention text A/AC.241/27 dd. 12 September 1994) are twofold:

1. To combat desertification and mitigate the effects of drought in countries experiencing serious drought and/or desertification, particularly in Africa, through effective action at all levels, supported by international cooperation and partnership arrangements, in the framework of an integrated approach which is consistent with Agenda 21, with a view to contributing to the achievement of sustainable development in affected areas.
2. Achieving this objective will involve long-term integrated strategies that focus simultaneously, in affected areas, on improved productivity of land, and the rehabilitation, conservation and sustainable management of land and water resources, leading to improved living conditions, in particular at the community level.

The Convention gives a broad interpretation to desertification: “land degradation in arid, semi-arid and dry sub-humid areas resulting from various factors, including climatic variations and human activities”. Land degradation in the Convention means “reduction or loss, in arid, semi-arid and dry sub-humid areas, of the biological or economic productivity and complexity of rainfed cropland, irrigated cropland, or range, pasture, forest and woodlands resulting from land uses or from a process or combination of processes, including processes arising from human activities and habitation patterns”. However, interpretations on CCD relevance so far can differ from one situation to the other.

The Convention has developed over time as a broad instrument drawing international attention to the need for using land and natural resources in “affected areas” (“arid, semi-arid and dry sub-humid areas affected or threatened by desertification”) in a sustainable manner. The broad application of the instrument does not make it always easy to decide on what a CCD-related activity is, and what is not.

The *Millennium Development Goals (MDGs)* as set in the 2000 United Nations Millennium Declaration can only be linked in two cases to UNCCD-related activities as defined above. These two cases are, in our understanding:

1. MDG 1 – Eradicate extreme poverty and hunger (targets 1 and 2); and
2. MDG 7 – Ensure environmental sustainability (target 9 – “Integrate the principles of sustainable development into country policies and programmes, and reverse the loss of environmental resources”).

Linking the UNCCD to MDGs 1 and 7 through OECD/DAC CRS codes

In order to link UNCCD objectives to MDGs in reporting the most efficient way is to analyse the possibilities to make use of the OECD/DAC CRS codes.

The link between UNCCD and MDG1 (target 1: reduce proportion of people whose income is less than \$ 1 per day; target 2: reduce proportion of people who suffer from hunger) is largely based on the assumption that combating desertification and land degradation makes a positive impact towards reaching the above targets. The link through CRS codes is not a mechanism that has been developed already and is thus immature so far. From our experience in this report the following 56 CRS codes are believed to be linked to MDG1:

- 151 – Government and civil society, general (15110, 15120, 15150: 3 codes)
- 160 – Other social infrastructure and services (16010, 16020, 16030, 16040, 16064: 5 codes)
- 311 – Agriculture (18 codes)
- 312 – Forestry (6 codes)
- 313 – Fishing (5 codes)
- 420 – Women in development (1 code)
- 430 – Other multi-sector aid (6 codes)
- 500 – Commodity aid and general programme assistance (4 codes)
- 700 – Emergency assistance and reconstruction (5 codes)
- 920 – Support to NGOs (3 codes)

The link between UNCCD and MDG 7 is relatively obvious but not easy to qualify due to the level of abstraction of the objectives of both the Convention and the MDG. Therefore a relatively wide selection of CRS codes has been opted for to qualify the link between a CCD-related activity and the MDG7. The 79 CRS codes in this report believed to be linked to MDG 7 are:

- 140 – Water supply and sanitation (7 codes)
- 151 – Government and civil society, general (8 codes)
- 230 – Energy generation and supply (17 codes)
- 311 – Agriculture (18 codes)
- 312 – Forestry (6 codes)
- 313 – Fishing (5 codes)
- 410 – General environmental protection (7 codes)
- 420 – Women in development (1 code)
- 430 – Other multi-sector aid (6 codes)
- 510 – General budget support (1 code)
- 920 – Support to NGOs (3 codes)

Calculating the contribution of the Netherlands supported UNCCD activities to MDGs 1 and 7

On the basis of the list of CCD-related activities as compiled from the Piramide database and reviewed by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the Royal Netherlands Embassies it is possible to give an indication of the contribution of Netherlands-funded UNCCD-related activities to the MDGs 1 and 7 (as linked to the selected sets of CRS codes in the above).

The Netherlands funded CCD-related activities with expenditure in 2005 corrected for CCD relevance (see methodology in the introductory chapter) contributed for the amount of €11,049,700 to MDG 1.

The Netherlands funded CCD-related activities with expenditure in 2005 also corrected for CCD relevance contributed for the amount of €25,200,600 to MDG 7.

5. CONTRIBUTION RELATED TO THE COMMITTEE ON SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY (CST)

In response to decision 10/COP 4 the Netherlands reports in this section on relevant scientific and technical activities to combat desertification.

The Netherlands are funding the CGIAR institutes that are doing research in contribution to the objectives of the CCD. However, not all research carried out by those research centres is CCD-related and also a big part of the funds are targeted to Africa. Generally 45% of the funding of the CGIAR institutes goes to regional CG institutes of which 48% is targeted to Sub-Saharan Africa. This means that of the 'unrestricted' core contribution of the Netherlands to CGIAR at least some 50% is used for research programmes in Asia and Latin America.

Two institutes solely work in Africa: WARDA and IITA, and CIFOR does apparently have no activities that contribute to CCD objectives.

Activities at CIAT in Colombia partly contribute to CCD because of their improvement programme of agro-ecosystems in the tropics. Also the Cassava Biotechnology Network 3 activities contribute to CCD implementation. In the CIMMYT CGIAR centre a comprehensive programme on rain-fed wheat systems are partly important for CCD objectives. The Rice-Wheat consortium in the Indus-Ganges area is working with zero-tillage and inland water cropping systems to effectively use the available water under water scarce conditions. In the CIP centre in the Andes region the Consortium for Sustainable Development for the Andean region is CCD-related through its Global Mountain Programme for some 10%. ICRISAT mainly supports CCD-related research partly targeted to Africa. ICRISAT is the executing agency of the desertification programme of ICARDA (on dryland agriculture). Improved land management to combat desertification is one example in the CWANA region (partly Africa).

IPGRI gives considerable attention to crops for the humid regions but their regional collaboration programmes are CCD-related. A smaller part of the activities concerns management of agricultural and forest biodiversity. For IRRI which is mainly targeting irrigated rice production an important part has been included because of their programme on improving productivity in fragile environments of rain fed and upland rice. With regard to ICRAF (the World Agroforestry Centre) it is estimated that only a small percentage of the activities are targeted to regions other than Africa. A small programme on Climate change mitigation for rural development could contribute to CCD implementation.

Because the unrestricted core contributions - in principle - are favouring all CG activities a general statement on the relation between CGIAR centres and the UNCCD is included here (taken from the CGIAR website): "CGIAR Centres that focus on dryland agriculture have a history of long involvement with the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD). ICRISAT represented the CGIAR in the United Nations' Intergovernmental Negotiating Committee on Desertification (INCD)'s process to elaborate the Convention during 1993-94. Since then, ICRISAT partnered with four additional Centres (ICRAF, IFPRI, ILRI, TSBF-CIAT) and nine sub-Sahara African countries to form the ecoregional Desert Margins Program to combat desertification. Since 1998, ICARDA was credentialed as an international organization representing all the CGIAR Centres to the UNCCD, and represents the CGIAR on the UNCCD's Global Mechanism Facilitation Committee. Uniting the efforts of CGIAR Centres in drylands, ICRISAT and ICARDA are proposing a Systemwide "Oasis" Program, and are actively participating in many of the scientific conferences and symposia to take place during the International Year of Deserts and Desertification. These Centres are actively participating in many of the scientific conferences and symposia to take place during the International Year of Deserts and Desertification.

CGIAR strategies to fight desertification are fully supportive of international efforts, including the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification, Convention on Biological Diversity, and United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change".

In adding-up the contributions of the Netherlands Government to CG institutes account is taken of the partial CCD relations and the fact that contributions can only be partially be targeted to non-African countries. More details on the research can be found in the reports of the CGIAR institutes.

Research in The Netherlands that has contributed to CCD implementation in Asia, Latin America and the Caribbean and Central and Eastern Europe can be found at different universities. Only two of the universities presented some of their activities (funded by the Netherlands Government).

In Amsterdam at the Free University (VU) a programme called SOW is active. This stands for the Centre for World Food Studies (Dutch acronym SOW-VU for "Stichting Onderzoek Wereldvoedsel-voorziening van de Vrije Universiteit"), founded in 1977. SOW-VU is a research institute that provides support, at both national and international levels, to the formulation of food and agricultural policies and policies aiming at poverty reduction. The Centre is engaged in applied and quantitative research. It co-operates with scientists and policy makers from developing countries so as to ensure that policy formulation and capacity building evolve together. The Centre also contributes to debates and policy dialogues on food related issues.

At the Wageningen University and Research centre with funds from the ministry of Agriculture, Nature and Food Quality of the Netherlands (ministry of LNV) the following relevant research topics were investigated in 2005:

- Himalayan Degradation - an interdisciplinary approach to analyse the dynamics of forest and soil degradation and to develop sustainable agro-ecological strategies for fragile Himalayan watersheds;
- IRMLA – Systems research network for Integrated Resource Management and Land use Analysis in East and South East Asia;
- VEGSYS - Sustainable technologies for pest, disease and soil fertility management in smallholder vegetable production in China and Vietnam;
- APWAM: Network Project on Water Management in Andhra Pradesh
