Programme and budget for the biennium 2016–2017

Note by the secretariat

Summary

This document presents an overview of the proposed programme budget of the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification for the biennium 2016–2017. In addition to presenting a summary of the required human and financial resources, it outlines the components of the budget using a results-based budgeting approach that responds to the 10-year strategic plan and framework to enhance the implementation of the Convention (2008–2018) (The Strategy), which was adopted by the Conference of the Parties at its eighth session.

The proposed budget should be considered together with the comprehensive multi-year workplan for the Convention (2016–2019) and the two-year costed work programme for the Convention (2016–2017), which are presented in document ICCD/COP(12)/6-ICCD/CRIC(14)/2. This budget document should be read in conjunction with the information on financial and programme performance for the biennium 2014–2015 contained in documents ICCD/COP(12)/7 and ICCD/CRIC(14)/3.

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I. Introduction

A. Mandate

1. Rule 10 (d) of the rules of procedure of the Conference of the Parties (COP)¹ provides that the provisional agenda of each ordinary session of the COP shall include, as appropriate, the proposed budget as well as all questions pertaining to the accounts and financial arrangements.

B. Scope of the note

2. This document presents an overview of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 2016–2017 by providing a summary of the human and financial resources required. In accordance with the 10-year strategic plan and framework to enhance the implementation of the Convention (2008–2018) (The Strategy), which was adopted by the COP at its eighth session, the resource requirements are based on two-year work programmes of the secretariat, the Global Mechanism (GM), the Committee for the Review of the Implementation of the Convention (CRIC), and the Committee on Science and Technology (CST), using a results-based management approach.

3. The proposed budget should be considered together with the comprehensive multi-year workplan for the Convention (2016–2019), and the two-year costed work programme for the Convention (2016–2017), which are presented in document ICCD/COP(12)/6-ICCD/CRIC(14)/2. The budget document should be read in conjunction with the information on financial and programme performance for the biennium 2014–2015, which is contained in documents ICCD/COP(12)/7 and ICCD/CRIC(14)/3.

II. Building the proposed programme budget

Funding overview

4. The work of the secretariat, the GM, the CRIC and the CST is funded from five trust funds:

- (a) The Trust Fund for the Core Budget of the UNCCD;
- (b) Trust Fund for Participation of Representatives of Eligible Parties in the Sessions of the UNCCD Conference;
- (c) Trust Fund for Voluntary Financing of Activities under the UNCCD;
- (d) Trust Fund for Voluntary Financing of Activities under the GM;
- (e) Trust Fund for Convention Events Organized by the UNCCD Secretariat (the Bonn Fund).

5. The core budget and the indicative scale of contributions from all Parties are approved by the COP. The indicative scale of contributions is based on the scale of assessment of the apportionment of the expenses of the United Nations adopted by the General Assembly. In the biennium 2016–2017, the indicative scale of contributions (see

annex I) has been established in accordance with General Assembly resolution 67/238, adopted by the General Assembly in December 2012 at its sixty-seventh session. The total amount of indicative contributions also takes into account the annual contribution of EUR 511,292 from the host Government.

III. Proposed budget for the Convention

A. Overview of core budget requirements

6. In the course of the biennium 2014–2015, the Executive Secretary restructured the secretariat by combining the unit that oversees the issues of advocacy, awareness-raising and education with the policy framework unit. The administration and finance services unit was later combined with the conference services unit. As a result, the proposed budget is presented by the respective area of work, including that of the GM, which is now presented as appropriation in the core budget.

7. Furthermore, the Executive Secretary, in accordance with paragraph 24 of decision 10/COP.11, has made efforts to implement efficiencies and creative innovations by introducing initiatives to keep costs for consultancies and travel to a minimum, which include hiring consultants at local rates, depending on the location of the project, and requiring thirty days advance booking of flight tickets. These initiatives are complemented by the practice of submitting quarterly consultancy and travel plans for the approval by the Executive Secretary. Therefore, the Executive Secretary has endeavoured to maintain the level of the proposed core budget for the biennium 2016–2017 at the level of the core budget for the biennium 2014–2015, representing a zero-nominal budget, excluding the past adjustment to the working capital reserve.

8. The estimated resource requirements for the core budget of the Convention for the biennium 2016–2017 may be found in table 1. For ease of reference, the proposed budget has been presented together with the approved budget for the biennium 2014–2015 as well as a revised approved budget aligned with the new structure for comparison.

10. With regard to the proposed staffing of the secretariat and the GM (see table 3), the Executive Secretary, in order to reflect the changing dynamic and increased scope of the UNCCD, is proposing to upgrade the position of Deputy Executive Secretary from D-1 to D-2. At the same time, the D-2 position in the GM has been cancelled with the position of the Managing Director now reclassified and established at the D-1 level. Further adjustments to the GM post table are proposed as a result of the retirement of staff creating four new positions at the P-3 level.

11. By committing to the same level of core budget for the biennium 2016–2017 as in the current biennium, the Executive Secretary would require flexibility nevertheless in implementing the post table. As further opportunities arise with the merging of the units of the secretariat and the departure of staff, there may be less necessity to maintain high-level positions. Therefore, the Executive Secretary would require the authority in the biennium 2016–2017 to establish additional lower-level positions than what are presented in the post table with the understanding that such adjustments are maintained within the same level of budget for staff costs.

12. More detailed information on the estimated resource requirements for the secretariat and the GM is contained in the document on the costed two-year work programmes for the biennium 2016–2017.²

B. Trust Fund for Participation of Representatives of Eligible Parties in the Sessions of the UNCCD Conference

13. In accordance with the financial rules of the COP, a special fund was established to support the participation of representatives of developing, and in particular least developed, country Parties affected by desertification and/or drought, particularly those in Africa, in the sessions of the COP and its subsidiary bodies.

14. The representatives of the developing countries continue to play an active role in the deliberations of the COP and its subsidiary bodies, assuming significant positions as Chairs or Vice-Chairs of the COP, the subsidiary bodies and contact groups. The active participation of the developing country representatives both at the technical and political levels contributes at each major session to building consensus and bringing about constructive outcomes to chart the path of the Convention ahead.

15. The estimated resource requirements for the fund may be found in table 4.

C. Trust Fund for Voluntary Financing of Activities under the UNCCD

16. The Trust Fund for Voluntary Financing of Activities under the UNCCD and the Trust Fund for Voluntary Financing of Activities of the GM complement the core resources of the secretariat and the GM by supporting the work of the Convention. Information on the secured activities that are supported by voluntary funding for the next biennium may be found in document ICCD/COP(12)/INF.4.

D. Trust Fund for Convention Events Organized by the UNCCD Secretariat (the Bonn Fund)

17. The host Government makes an additional annual contribution of EUR 511,292 to fund Convention events by the secretariat. Known as the 'Bonn Fund', it is utilized according to a cost plan which is proposed by the secretariat and accepted by the Government of Germany. Table 5 shows an overview of the estimated budget for the biennium 2016–2017.

E. Programme support costs (overheads)

18. In accordance with the financial rules of the COP and standard practice of the United Nations, a rate of 13 per cent is charged to all trust funds for programme support services, or overheads. These support services are mostly used to cover the costs of administrative support staff and secretariat staff costs at the United Nations liaison office in New York, as well as a Programme Officer for one region. Table 6 indicates the estimated human and financial resource requirements for the next biennium, which are contingent upon associated income to the special account.

IV. Contingencies

A. Contingency budget for conference servicing approved by the General Assembly

19. The General Assembly has in its past decisions approved a provision for conference services (interpretation, document reproduction and other related services) as part of the regular budget of the United Nations for meetings of the COP and its subsidiary bodies. If the General Assembly decides not to continue this practice, Parties would have to assume the costs of this provision. The following contingency budget has therefore been prepared for consideration by the COP.

20. It is assumed that the CST will meet for three working days and the CRIC for a total of five working days in the biennium. The provision will be required for corresponding meeting services, allowing for a total of six meetings with interpretation for the CST session and ten meetings with interpretation for the CRIC session as well as the translation, processing and distribution of a total estimated 1,000 pages for the pre-session, 80 pages of in-session and 100 pages of post-session documentation.

21. It is also assumed that the COP will meet for a total of two consecutive weeks in 2017. The provision will be required for corresponding meeting services, allowing for two simultaneous meetings with interpretation at any time during the session of the COP (that is, 20 meetings per week) and the translation, processing and distribution of an estimated 2,000 pages of pre-session, 150 pages of in-session, and 200 pages of post-session documentation. The full cost of these requirements, estimated at EUR 2.1 million, may be found in table 7.

B. Contingency budget for hosting the Conference of the Parties in Bonn, Germany

22. In the event that the thirteenth session of the COP is held in Bonn, an additional amount of EUR 1.5 million (see table 8) will be required to cover the costs relating to logistical arrangements, including renting of the conference venue, installation of communication systems and contracting of local staff, provision of security equipment and personnel, and rental of equipment and supplies.

C. Contingency budget for hosting the sessions of the Committee on Science and Technology and the Committee for the Review of the Implementation of the Convention in Bonn, Germany

23. In the event that the fifth special session of the CST and the fifteenth session of the CRIC are held in Bonn, an additional amount of EUR 678,000 (see table 9) will be required to cover the costs relating to logistical arrangements, including renting of the conference venue, installation of communication systems and contracting of local staff, provision of security equipment and personnel, and rental of equipment and supplies.

24. In consideration of the challenges faced by the UNCCD secretariat in the last three bienniums in finding a host for the sessions of the CST and the CRIC, Parties may wish to consider authorizing the Executive Secretary in the event that a host country is not forthcoming to fund the sessions in Bonn, Germany either (1) through a contingency budget to be added to the core budget; or (2) from the reserves of the Trust Fund for the Core Budget of the UNCCD.

V. UNCCD Evaluation Office

25. The UNCCD secretariat and the GM are requested to regularly evaluate their activities by the United Nations regulations and rules governing programme aspects of the budget,³ and also according to the standard procedures of many donors. A UNCCD Evaluation Office was established in 2014 to meet these requests.

26. The UNCCD Evaluation Office is intended to serve as a means to promote greater understanding of the work carried out under the UNCCD and strengthen the external credibility and accountability of the secretariat and the GM. It will also support the oversight responsibilities and decision-making of the management of the secretariat and the GM, and enhance the internal culture of learning.

27. The assessments and evaluations conducted by the UNCCD Evaluation Office will be evidence-based and objective. In the conduct of its activities, the Office will give an opportunity to UNCCD staff, management and, when feasible, national authorities and other stakeholders, to comment on the assessment or evaluation before it is presented to the COP. Its evaluation reports are meant to be openly available, and they may be accompanied by comments from the secretariat and GM management, staff, relevant country authorities and others involved in the subject matter.

28. The UNCCD Evaluation Office has one professional staff funded from the programme support costs. An allocation from the UNCCD core budget is proposed for recruiting independent evaluators and publicizing the results. Project-level monitoring and evaluation will be included in the overall costs of each project.

29. For every biennium, the UNCCD Evaluation Office prepares its work programme, which takes into account different types of evaluations and assessments. This work programme will be consistent with, and responsive to, the work of the United Nations external auditors concerning the UNCCD. It is presented to the COP at each of its sessions for feedback.

30. The proposed 2016–2017 UNCCD Evaluation Office work programme is presented in table 10. This programme may be adjusted in the light of other tasks or further evaluation or assessment tasks assigned by the COP, and to take into account any new voluntarily funded project that will be launched during the biennium.

VI. Conclusions and recommendations

31. This programme budget proposal presents the resource requirements for the work programmes of the secretariat, the GM, the CST and the CRIC. The COP may therefore wish:

- (a) To adopt the work plan and work programmes of the secretariat and the GM;
- (b) To approve a programme budget for the biennium 2016–2017;
- (c) To adopt the indicative scale of contributions for 2016 and 2017;
- (d) To authorize the Executive Secretary to notify Parties of their contributions for 2016;
- (e) To take note of the requirements for voluntary contributions to the Trust Fund for Participation of Representatives of Eligible Parties in the Sessions of the UNCCD Conference;

(f) To approve a contingency for conference services in the event that the General Assembly decides not to provide resources for these activities in the United Nations regular budget for the biennium 2016–2017.
