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GLOBAL MECHANISM: COMPILATION OF REVISED OFFERS OF INTERNATIONAL
FUND FOR AGRICULTURAL DEVELOPMENT (IFAD) AND UNITED NATIONS
DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME (UNDP)

Note by the secretariat

I. INTRODUCTION

1. Article 21, paragraph 6, of the Convention requires the Conference of the Parties (COP) at its first session to "make appropriate arrangements with the organization it has identified to house the Global Mechanism for the administrative operations of such Mechanism, drawing to the extent possible on existing budgetary and human resources".

2. In operative paragraph 2 of its decision 10/18, taken at its resumed tenth session, the Intergovernmental Negotiating Committee for Desertification (INCD) accordingly requested the secretariat to develop proposals on the administrative and operational modalities of the Global Mechanism (GM) for consideration and adoption by the COP at its first session. This was to be done in consultation with IFAD and UNDP, the two institutions that the INCD, in its decision 10/3, invited to make the revised offers to house the Global Mechanism contained in Appendices II and III of document ICCD/COP(1)/5.

3. In response to this request, and after consultation with IFAD and UNDP, the Annex to this document contains proposals for the administrative and operational modalities of the Global Mechanism under two scenarios: housing by IFAD and housing by UNDP.

II. SCOPE OF PROPOSALS ON ADMINISTRATIVE AND OPERATIONAL MODALITIES

4. Part B of Appendix I to document ICCD/COP(1)/5 lists the criteria that the INCD recommended to the COP for selecting an organization to house the Global Mechanism. Sections 2 and 3 of Part B deal respectively with the relationship of the Global Mechanism to the COP and with administrative and other support. These two sections define, in effect, the administrative and operational modalities to be considered, including the following categories:

(a) status of the Global Mechanism within the institution, including organizational and administrative arrangements to ensure accountability to the Conference and responsiveness to Conference guidelines;

(b) modalities of Global Mechanism accountability to the Conference and reporting on Global Mechanism activities;

(c) procedures for the Conference to enter into agreements with the institution regarding Global Mechanism functions and modalities, including the nature, form and timing;

(d) administrative infrastructure available to support activities of the Global Mechanism, including location, office space, personnel, financial, communications, information management and field office frameworks;

(e) modalities of staffing the Global Mechanism; and

(f) projected costs of operation of the Global Mechanism, the extent to which the institution would absorb them and the nature of charges to the Conference of the Parties for costs not absorbed.

III. PRESENTATION OF PROPOSALS

5. The first column of the Annex closely follows the above categories in structuring the two sets of proposals for the administrative and operational modalities of the Global Mechanism. In summarizing the projected costs of operation of the Global Mechanism, it distinguishes between costs in 1998, when financing from the normal Convention budget will not be possible, and costs in 1999. It also adds an item on the possible modalities of receiving, segregating and disbursing resources made available to the Global Mechanism for its functioning and activities from bilateral and multilateral sources through the host organization and other organizations. This could be important if the COP approved some version of paragraph 4 (e) of Part A of Appendix I to document ICCD/COP(1)/5 along the lines of addendum 1 to that document.

6. The second and third columns of the Annex provide details of administrative and operational modalities under the two housing scenarios. They draw largely on the revised offers of IFAD and UNDP as contained in Appendices II and III of document ICCD/COP(1)/5 with appropriate cross references to avoid duplication. They also incorporate any new information that IFAD or UNDP provided in the course of consultations on this document.

7. The third column, building on the scenario of UNDP housing, reflects the following UNDP views as communicated in a memorandum to the secretariat dated 5 September 1997:

"We do not think it is appropriate or even possible at this point in time to elaborate in great detail the administrative and operational modalities of the GM since these will depend on the hosting arrangement selected by the COP. Because of this and the uncertainty regarding paragraph 4 relating to the functions of the GM (on resource mobilization), it is our view that specific details such as the administrative structures, number of staff and their grades, location and office space, etc. should await the decision on the functions and hosting arrangements."
