## I. ORGANIZATION OF THE SESSION

### A. Opening of the session

1. On 11 December 2000, the Executive Secretary of the secretariat of the Convention to Combat Desertification, Mr. Hama Arba Diallo, welcomed participants of the Conference of the Parties and made a statement.

2. Statements were made by H.E. Mr. José Sarney Filho, Minister of State for the Environment of the Republic of Brazil and President of the third session of the Conference of the Parties and H.E. Mr. Harri Holkeri, President of the General Assembly.

3. Welcoming addresses were also made by Mr. Johannes Rau, President of the Federal Republic of Germany, and Mrs. Bärbel Dieckmann, Lord Mayor of Bonn.

4. Summaries of the statements made during the welcoming ceremony are to be found in annex I.

5. The fourth session of the Conference of the Parties, convened pursuant to article 22 of the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification, was opened in Bonn, Germany, on 11 December 2000, by the President of the third session of the Conference of the Parties, H.E. Mr. José Sarney Filho, Minister of State for the Environment of the Republic of Brazil.

### B. Election of the President (Agenda item 1)

6. At its 1st plenary meeting, on 11 December, the Conference elected Mr. Zamba Batjargal, Head of the Delegation of Mongolia, President of its fourth session by acclamation.

7. At the same meeting, the President made a statement.

### C. Attendance

8. The session was attended by representatives of 144 Parties to the Convention. Observers from eleven States not Parties to the Convention, representatives of United Nations offices, organizations of the United Nations system and specialized agencies also attended.

### D. Opening and general statements

9. At the 2nd plenary meeting, on 12 December, the Executive Secretary of the secretariat of the Convention to Combat Desertification made a statement.

10. At the same meeting, statements were made by the Secretary-General of the World Meteorological Organization, the Assistant President of the International Fund for Agricultural Development and the Executive Secretary of the Convention on Migratory Species of Wild Animals.

11. At the same meeting, statements were made by the representatives of the Director Generals of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations and the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization.

12. Also at the same meeting, statements were made by the representatives of Nigeria (on behalf of the Group of 77 and China), France (on behalf of the European Union), Chile (on behalf of the Latin American and Caribbean Group), Benin (on behalf of the African Group) and the Syrian Arab Republic (on behalf of the Asian Group).

13. The representative of the German Working Group on Desertification made a statement on behalf of the community of non-governmental organizations.

14. Summaries of the opening and general statements referred to in paragraphs 9 to 13 are to be found in annex II.

## **II. ORGANIZATIONAL MATTERS**

### **A. Adoption of the agenda**

(Agenda item 3)

15. At its 2nd plenary meeting, on 12 December, the Conference adopted its agenda as contained in ICCD/COP(4)/1.

### **B. Election of officers other than the President**

(Agenda item 2)

16. The Conference elected by acclamation the following officers to serve as vice-presidents on the Bureau for the fourth session, in addition to the President and Chairperson of the Committee on Science and Technology:

17. The Conference elected Mr. Olarewanju Smith (Canada) as Chairperson of the Committee on Science and Technology.

C. Organization of work  
(Agenda item 3)

18. At its 2nd plenary meeting, the Conference approved the proposed organization of work for the session, as contained in ICCD/COP(4)/1, annex II, on the understanding that minor modifications might be made as necessary.

D. Establishment of the Committee of the Whole  
(Agenda item 3)

19. At its 2nd plenary meeting, the Conference decided to establish a Committee of the Whole to consider outstanding issues for adoption by the Conference.

20. At the same meeting, upon the proposal of the President, the Conference elected Mr. Kabelo Mafura (Lesotho) Chairman of the Committee of the Whole. He will also be an ex-officio member of the Bureau.

E. Establishment of the Ad Hoc Working Group

21. At the third session of the Conference of the Parties, by decision 6/COP.3, the Conference established an ad hoc working group to conduct an in depth review and analysis of reports submitted at its third and fourth sessions. It is the understanding of the Conference that the Ad Hoc Working Group shall be a subsidiary body of the Conference of the Parties.

22. At its 4th meeting, on 14 December, the Conference elected Mr. Willem R.J. Van Cotthem (Belgium) and Mr. Mohamed Mahmoud El-Ghaouth (Mauritania) as Co-Chairmen of the Ad Hoc Working Group. The Conference decided, on an exceptional basis, that the two Co-Chairmen would also serve as ex officio members of the Bureau.

23. At its 1st meeting, on 15 December, the Ad Hoc Working Group elected by acclamation Mr. Mohammad Reza Jabbari (Islamic Republic of Iran), Sr. Octavio Pérez Pardo (Argentina) and Mr. Ogtay Jafarov (Azerbaijan) as Vice-Chairmen. Mr. Jafarov was also designated as Rapporteur of the Ad Hoc Working Group.

24. The Ad Hoc Working Group held nine meetings from 15 to 21 December, and adopted its interim report which was submitted to the Conference of the Parties for consideration. The Conference of the Parties adopted the said report at its 12th meeting, on 23rd December.

F. Committee on Science and Technology

25. The Committee on Science and Technology was convened under the chairmanship of Mr. Olarewanju Smith (Canada). The committee held seven meetings, from 12 to 15 December 2000.

26. At its 1st and 2nd meetings, on 12 and 13 December, the Committee elected by acclamation Mr. Mebrahtu Iyassu (Eritrea), Mr. M. Nuruzzaman (Bangladesh), Mr. Rafael Obregon Vilorio (Mexico) and Mr. Valentin Sofroni (Republic of Moldova) as Vice-Chairmen.

27. The Committee on Science and Technology submitted a number of recommendations to the Conference of the Parties, which took action on them at its 12th meeting, on 23rd December.

Annex I

**SUMMARIES OF STATEMENTS MADE AT THE WELCOMING CEREMONY**

1. At the welcoming ceremony of COP 4 on 11 December 2000, Mr. Hama Arba Diallo, Executive Secretary of the UNCCD secretariat, expressed his appreciation to the German authorities for having been so closely associated to the preparation of the Conference.
2. He recalled the challenges faced by UNCCD in the year 2000, especially the various natural disasters which affected most regions and presented the activities undertaken by the secretariat at the regional level during the period under review.
3. He urged the Conference of the Parties for more solidarity, as strongly advocated by the Convention, in opening the next phase of the process, the implementation of action programmes to combat desertification.
4. Mr. José Sarney Filho, Minister for the Environment of Brazil, highlighted the urgent need for a change which would balance production and consumption with regard to the world's environment carrying capacity. Describing a pessimistic picture of environment depletion in the context of globalization, he called for a more efficient network of world solidarity. He also reminded the Conference that public social policies are more efficient when they rely on popular participation.
5. H.E. Mr Harri Holkeri, President of the General Assembly of the United Nations at its fifty-fifth session, underlined the importance of UNCCD, which focuses on areas where the balance between the needs of human beings and those of ecosystems is most delicate and most difficult to achieve. He paid special attention to the situation in Africa, where the land degradation hits the poorest people most seriously, and pointed out that cooperation and partnership are keys to practical and wise measures towards sustainable development.
6. In her welcoming address, the Lord Mayor of Bonn, Mrs. Bärbel Dieckmann, indicated how much the Federal Republic of Germany values the Conference's task. She reminded the Conference that during recent years the City of Bonn had intensified its activities in the field of development cooperation.
7. In his address to the Conference, the President of the Federal Republic of Germany, Mr. Johannes Rau, underlined the need for industrialized countries of the north to adopt patterns of production and consumption that did not destroy people's chances in other parts of the world to lead a decent life. He thanked the countries represented at COP 4 for their decision, three years before, to establish the headquarters of the permanent secretariat of UNCCD in Bonn, and made it clear that Germany was willing to shoulder its international responsibilities.

Annex II

**SUMMARIES OF OPENING AND GENERAL STATEMENTS**

1. Mr. Hama Arba Diallo, Executive Secretary of UNCCD, summarized the activities undertaken at the national, subregional and regional levels, and reported that a Round Table of Parliamentarians would be held on 12 and 13 December 2000, in parallel with the COP sessions.
2. On behalf of the Group of 77 and China, the representative of Nigeria called for the enhancement of the Global Mechanism (GM) to enable it to fulfil its mandate, the establishment of an institutional structure to monitor UNCCD implementation, and the formulation of a declaration of commitments with a time frame and measurable results.
3. On behalf of the European Union, the representative of France noted some shortcomings in the function of the Committee on Science and Technology, which resulted in delays in effective UNCCD implementation, and called on the Committee to reorganize its procedures for consistency with its mandate.
4. On behalf of the Latin America and the Caribbean region, the representative of Chile underscored the need for financial and technical support to prepare the national action programmes (NAPs), a COP 4 decision to support the regional coordination units from the secretariat's budget, and specific initiatives undertaken in collaboration with other United Nations agencies, the Global Environment Facility and donor countries to finance regional and subregional action programmes.
5. On behalf of the African Group, the representative of Benin called on COP 4 to ensure that the Ad Hoc Working Group established by COP 3 remained open-ended and that its existence should not hinder negotiations to create a committee to review UNCCD implementation, that work continues in the inter-sessional period, and that conclusions and recommendations from the various Parties and the Ad Hoc Working Group are part of a COP 5 decision. He supported the Group of 77 and China's call to assign the GEF as the temporary financial mechanism of the Convention.
6. On behalf of the Asian Group, the representative of the Syrian Arab Republic emphasized the need to combat desertification at the international level in order to foster development.
7. The representative of the World Meteorological Organization invited the COP to give special attention to, *inter alia*, developing and enhancing proactive drought early warning systems; determining vulnerability profiles and comprehensive assessment of social, economic and environmental impacts, based on indicators that can be monitored as drought develops; and providing technical and financial resources to the most vulnerable countries.

8. Noting some steep increases in the number of requests for the Global Mechanism's services, the representative of the International Fund for Agricultural Development said that bilateral support to the GM had been sporadic and insufficient. He urged the COP to reaffirm its commitments to support the GM and to ensure that it was allocated the resources necessary for it to perform its duties effectively.

9. The representative of the Convention on Migratory Species of Wild Animals called for synergies at all levels, including national levels, between the UNCCD and CMS.

10. The representative of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations highlighted the need to strengthen efforts to identify and disseminate simple and effective agricultural practices that simultaneously enhance resource and biodiversity conservation, food security and social stability and improve incomes, and to undertake and implement institutional reforms to strengthen local populations' access to, *inter alia*, micro-credit and agricultural markets in order to ensure food security.

11. The representative of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization outlined its initiatives to produce educational materials on combating desertification, and its planned scientific studies, including research into traditional knowledge.

12. On behalf of the community of non-governmental organizations accredited to COP 4, the German Working Group on Desertification expressed concern regarding, *inter alia*, the lack of civil society participation in the NAP process, calling for an evaluation of such participation, and the lack of priority accorded to desertification by some affected country Parties and their partners to development.

Annex IV

**PRESIDENT'S SUMMARY OF STATEMENTS MADE DURING THE SPECIAL SEGMENT**

1. Over a period of two days, the participants in the high-level segment presented the contributions of their respective countries or organizations towards the effective implementation of the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification. The discussions were enhanced by the presence of a considerable number of ministers, high government officials, and executive heads of UNEP, IFAD and the GEF, as well as representatives of interregional, regional and other organizations.
2. Opening the session, the President of the Conference, H.E. Mr. Bartjargal said that the UNCCD could considerably improve conditions in affected countries.
3. Mr. Diallo, Executive Secretary of the UNCCD, called for an extensive review of national implementation reports.
4. A message from H.E. Mr. Kofi Annan, Secretary-General of the United Nations, appealed to donors to mobilize adequate resources for affected developing country use.
5. Mrs. Bärbel Dieckmann, Mayor of Bonn, called for networking and collaboration, which she said were the only ways to combat desertification effectively.
6. Representatives of affected developing countries described, in their statements, national efforts to combat desertification, including the development of national action programmes. They cited the principal difficulties hampering the implementation of the Convention in these regions and appealed for the strengthening of cooperation with their principal development partners.
7. Participants made some further points:
  - They called for a Global Environment Facility (GEF) window to fund UNCCD implementation;
  - They called on the World Trade Organization to address concerns affecting Africa;
  - They explained poor nations' inability to deal with desertification due to dwindling development resources, the negative impact of globalization, and trends in international commodity markets;
  - They pleaded to UNCCD for support as a step towards environmental justice.
8. In their presentations, developed countries described their support to affected developed countries and regions.
9. The Parties also heard Mr. Joachim Tappe, member of the German Parliament, who presented the declaration adopted by the Round Table of Parliamentarians with regard to the implementation of the UNCCD. The Conference took note of the declaration by the Parliamentarians with satisfaction.

Annex V

**SUMMARIES OF STATEMENTS MADE AT THE CLOSING CEREMONY**

1. The Executive Secretary of the UNCCD, Mr. Hama Arba Diallo, said that the Conference of the Parties at its fourth session had succeeded in coming up with conclusions towards furthering implementation of the UNCCD. He noted that the results of the AHWG had met Parties' expectations. He highlighted other achievements including, in the additional implementation annex, the declaration, proposals for improving the work of the CST and the decision related to the GEF and how to enhance access to that body in order to assist countries with UNCCD implementation.

2. Nigeria, for the group of 77 and China, thanked the President of the Conference, the Bureau, the Executive Secretary, the secretariat and the delegates. He highlighted actions needed to assist affected countries and the need for new and additional funding as well as steady and predictable sources funding.

3. The President of the Conference highlighted positive aspects of the two-week COP meeting and assured his commitment to make the Convention a tool for changing people's lives in affected areas.
